- 3. Senate: Use the Senate's contact page to find contact information for your U.S. senators. (https://www.senate.gov/states/NY/intro.htm)
- 4. Local Government: Check your city or county's official website for contact information for local officials such as mayors, county executives, and council members. (https://www.monroecounty.gov/)
- 5. Phone: You can call the U.S. House switchboard at (202) 224-3121 to be connected to your representative's office
- 6. Mail: Write a letter to your representatives. Addresses for members of Congress can be found on their official websites or through the Clerk of the House.
